


Books with Judaic Content




Fiction

Worse, the ghosts expect him to help them re-take their ship, now restored and on display in a local museum, so they can make their way to Libertalia, a legendary pirate utopia. The only problem is that this motley crew hasn't left the house in almost two hundred years and is terrified of going outside. 




Graphic Novels

Ghosts, by Raina Telgemeier. Catrina and her family have moved to the coast of Northern California for the sake of her little sister, Maya, who has cystic fibrosis.
